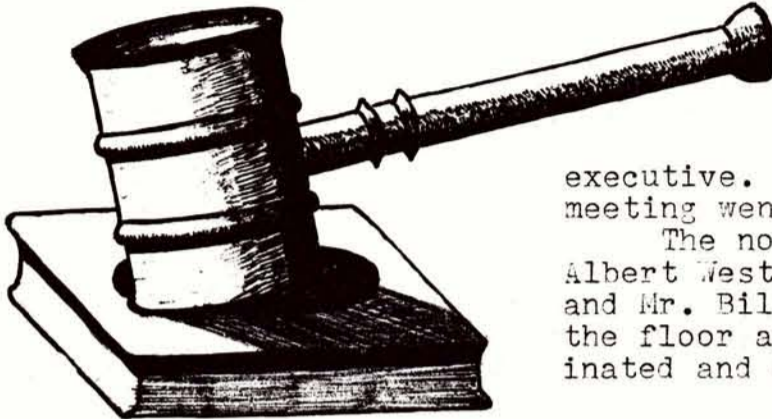

The guest speaker for last meeting was Mr. Munroe, current president of Toronto Coin Club and is an avid student of Numismatics.

Mr. Munroe's talk was entitled "Evelution of Ships on Coins and Medals" and he showed several interesting colour slides of his collection. There was also a display of the rarer medals based on his topic.

Mr. Munroe began his talk with the early history of ships when Primative man utilized anything that would float. He continued into the Roman era, about the time of Cleopatra. During this time ships built without a keel; ships with scented sails; and ships using ores manned by slaves were common.

From this early time, Mr. Munroe traced out the development of the larger ships. For instance, in Lebanon, ships built with 40 ores and 4000 rowers were common. The Viking ships used the dragon-head bow to scare off the enemy, and angry gods. On the 11th or 12th century Sandwich half penny, an early "crow's nest" appears.
