Brain Twister

The Question: What is the terminology used to describe pieces struck with both sides up and one side upside down to the other?

The Answer: is not upside-down-coin or counterfeit. Check your copy of the Guide Book of Canadian Coins Paper Currency and Tokens under definitions and abbreviations. Medal design identifies coins with both obverse and reverse right side up (like Canadian coins), and coinage design applies to pieces with the obverse upside down to the reverse (like U.S.)

New Brain Twister: (answer next month) What is the significance of the design on the P.E.I. 1 cent piece of 1871?
