One diskette can hold up to 160,000 characters of information on it. It was too bad that only 30 members and guests were on hand to hear his presentation.

At the July meeting the president and John Regitko gave a report on the C.N.A. convention the previous week they had attended in Moncton. For the benefit of the members it didn't get to the convention or to the July meeting the following is resume of how the convention went:

There were approximately 15 members of the club<sup>1st</sup> at took in the convention. The registration attendance was higher of both the previous two years namely Toronto and Winnipeg.

There were around 28 bourse tables doing brisk business during the 3 days of the convention with quite a few from Ontario and the Maritimes. There were over 100-115 cases of competitive displays and another 20 cases of non-competitive displays.

If you flew into Moncton they had van buses to take you to the hotel downtown and to take you back to the airport on the Sunday after the convention. We stayed from supper time on the Tuesday until late afternoon on the Sunday.

The results of the C.N.A. election were the following: For 1st-Vice-President Stanley Cluté defeated Scoop Lewry. For 2nd. Vice-President: Al. Bliman defeated Douglas Franklin. For Ontario Director: Bill Cross defeated Don Robb.

The convention started on Wednesday one day earlier than usual because nothing happens in Moncton on Sundays. The general meeting of the C.N.A. was well attended in the afternoon which was followed by a tour of the city and suburbs in 2 buses, which lasted for over 1 hour. This was followed after the tour by the Royal Canadian Mint reception for both dealers and registrants.

The convention was officially opened at 10:00 A.M. on the Thursday morning by the Mayor of Moncton George Rideout and a member of the cabinet of the New Brunswick Government who represents the riding for Moncton in the legislature. When the bourse room closed at 5:00 P.M., four buses took the dealers and registrants to Shediac about 30 miles away from Moncton and taken on how they catch lobsters after the boat ride we were taken back to the seashore restaurant where we had lobster or some people had steak dinners which was followed by a 4 piece band for entertainment. This lasted until around 10:00 P.M.,

Friday featured the C.P.M.S. luncheon with Scoop Lewry as the luncheon speaker. In the last several years the attendance at the C.P.M.S. luncheon has been around 25-30 but this year the attendance was 51. Plaques of appreciation for their services to C.P.M.S. went to three of our members, Al. Bliman, Herb. Bishop and George Fraser, this was followed by the annual general meeting of the C.P.M.S. and the C.N.A. Junior Forum. After the bourse room closed at 8:00 P.M. there was entertainment by 2 actors and 1 actress who are going around New Brunswick this year to promote the 200 anniversary next year of the province. This entertainment lasted about an hour and twenty minutes.

Saturday morning featured the C.N.A. delegate's breakfast which about 40 people were in attendance. The best provincial bulletin went to the Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association. The best coin club bulletin went to the Regina Coin Club. The best Coin Week Canada scrap book went to the Calgary Numismatic Association, 2nd. prize went to Regina Coin Club, 3rd. prize went to the St. Laurent Numismatic Association and honorary mention to the Junior Club of Helena, Montana, and the only other entry was from the Summerside Coin Club of Summerside, P.E.I.

This was followed by the C.N.A. Educational Forum which featured Richard Becker of Acton Centre, Maryland on the paper money of the Maritimes which included over 80 slides which included some rare notes from his own collection. Geoff. Bell came next and he talked on the medals that the Wyon family of England had produced for the Maritimes in the 18 and 19th. centuries. The third speaker was James Corkery, Master of the Royal Canadian Mint giving an up date what has happened lately and what is in the plans in the near future at the mint. This seminar was very well attended which was held over the noon hour.

The Guy Potter Literary Award went to Mr. Peters of England. The Best of Show which is the Gold Medal for the best display went to Jean Bullen of Rockford, Illinois for her Newfoundland coinage display which was also first in the Canadian Decimal category. Royal Canadian Mint medal went to the banquet speaker Major Sheldon Carroll of Ottawa former curator for the Bank of Canada. C.N.A. Ferguson Award went to Norm. Williams of New Westminster, B.C., a past-president of the C.N.A. There were around 160 at the closing banquet on the Saturday evening.

For a club of only 15 members, the new C.N.A. President Geoff. Bell who was convention co-chairman along with Wayne Gillcash and along with the Moncton Coin Club President Malcolm Freeborn who acted as master of ceremonies at the closing banquet deserve a lot of credit because of all of the C.N.A. conventions I have attended over the years since 1957 this is the best run one of all better than the one here in 1981. It was truly the hospitality convention as indicated on the registrant's badge. In closing for the benefit of the members who collect the annual C.N.A. convention medals they are completely sold out this year which included 200 bronze and 100 silver which were made this year for the first time by the Royal Canadian Mint.
