Paul Johnson had convention photos on display and announced the excellent educational programme, which he ran, was taped. Del Murchison went on the visit to the Numismatic Museum and was upset about the methods of mounting of the coins and medals. Many had been polished and lacquered for the purpose of preserving their appearance. Roger Fox reported the Canadian Tire meeting had in excess of 40 members in attendance. They issued a 10th Anniversary pin and the Anniversary was celebrated with a huge barbecue.

C.N.A. Ottawa 50th Anniversary Convention by Harvey Farrow, NYCC Club Delegate

Ron Zelk and I left Toronto around 10:00 A.M. on Wednesday, arriving in Ottawa shortly after 3:30 P.M. We didn't stay at the Novotel, the convention hotel site which is about 1 1/2 blocks away from the Congress Centre in downtown Ottawa and about 2 1/2 blocks south east of the Parliament Buildings. After resting an hour we made the 4 1/2 blocks walk to the Congress Centre.



I picked up my registration kit, which I ordered about 3 weeks before the convention. Unfortunately, Ron had been on a 2 week vacation and he e-mailed his. They didn't receive it and by the time we arrived on Wednesday, over 200 registrations had been received. The convention committee had hoped for 200, but Ron was 212. There was a shortage of contents and he got about 20% to 25% of what was in a full kit. All of the silver medals had been sold out. I understand that only 40 where struck.

We were too late for the only scheduled event for Wednesday, the 9:45 A.M. to 3:00 P.M tour of the National Capital Region. It included a trip through Government House, the official residence of the Governor-General of Canada. There was also a C.N.A. Past Presidents' Dinner in the evening, with only 2 past Presidents unable to attend. Included in the registration kit was information on an unpublicized event. A reception was hosted by the City of Ot-

tawa Coin Club to honour the late Sheldon Carroll, the first President of the C.N.A. It was scheduled between 9:30 P.M. and 11.00 P.M. at the Marble Works Restaurant and Tavern, only 2 1/2 blocks away from the Congress Centre. Ron and I decided we wouldn't take this in and left the Centre after 6:30 P.M., walking back to our hotel and having supper across the street and an early night.

Scheduled for first thing Thursday morning was the traditional Bourse and display preview followed by the Official Opening at 10:00 A.M. The bourse room was open both Thursday and Friday until 6:00 P.M. The bourse and exhibits were in a single large room, with about 100 cases of exhibits and over 50 bourse dealers. There was lots of room to move around in the room between dealers and the displays. According to Tim Henderson, the Head Judge of the exhibits, it was the best exhibits he had seen at the convention in the 20 years that he has been involved with the judging.


The next big event was the tour of the Royal Canadian Mint. It was attended to capacity and gave everyone participating the opportunity to walk the production floor in the rolling mill, a melting room where bars are formed, and a working vault area where the raw metal is received and assayed. A highlight was the opportunity for each visitor to strike four sterling silver twenty-five cent pieces with the August 2000 millennium design. The visitors were allowed to keep one, while turning the other three in. The Mint was shut down for vacation for three weeks during the time of our visit, so it was both unfortunate that visitors did not get to see actual operations, but also fortunate that they were able to move about so freely in each area.

The launching for the C.N.A. 50th anniversary book, A Half Century of Advancement in Numismatics, by Stanley Clute, occurred at 2:00 P.M. and lasted for about 30 minutes. The book details both history and events over the last 50 years. The book was \$15.00 to buy at the convention, but is still available by mail for \$18.00 through the C.N.A. office in Barrie, Ont. Also for sale was a 50th anniversary goldene medal featuring the image of Sheldon Carroll, the first President. It is available for \$10.00. In addition, a special souvenir script note was issued along with a commemorative lapel pin. Both are available for

Mint President Danielle Wetherup said, "The Millennium Medallion complements the collector series by symbolizing our natural and cultural diversity." The 2000 Millennium Medallion is a limited edition piece. The Medallion is only available through the purchase of the 2000 Millennium Souvenir Set.

Obverse: The year 2000 surrounded by repetitive stylized Maple leaves of the RCM logo

Reverse: The image on the 2000 Millennium Medallion depicts the Provinces and territories as maple leaves which together make up the map of Canada.

The social event for Thursday evening was the Royal Canadian Mint reception starting at 7:00 P.M. and lasting until about 9:00 P.M. The Mint has hosted a reception on the first evening of the Convention for a few years now, but this is the first time that the event has actually taken place at the Mint. Buses left the Novotel Hotel starting at 6:30 P.M for the trip up Sussex Drive. The reception was held on the 3rd floor of the Mint where senior offices and meeting rooms are located and overflowed out onto a roof-top patio which overlooks the War Museum. Back in 1950 the War Museum was the Public Archives building which is "Where It All Began" for the C.N.A.

During the reception wine and beer flowed along with cold and hot food. During the reception there was a short ceremony for the unveiling of the Mint's Millennium Medallion. It included a speech by Danielle Wetherup, Master of the Mint, and Maurice Bissonnette, the Medallion's designer. Buses started leaving around 8:30 P.M. for the trip back to the hotel. As each guest left through the main gate guardhouse they where given one of the encapsulated 25-cent piece silver coins struck earlier in the day during the Mint tour. I would estimate that about 300 attended the event.




August 2000 Millennium 25-cent Struck on the tour and distributed to the reception guests

I used Friday as the day that I would have the most time to go through the Bourse room and see the displays. Also on this day were the C.P.M.S. luncheon and general meeting at noon, immediately followed by the Classical & Medieval Numismatic Society meeting.

Friday's social event was the Bank of Canada reception. This was an outstanding event. It was the first time for all of the Ottawa conventions that the Bank of Canada hosted a reception for the convention goers. The museum was opened in 1980, which was after the last C.N.A. Ottawa convention held in 1976. Buses again left the Novotel Hotel at 6:30 P.M

and dropped us off at the east entrance of the Bank of Canada on Sparks Street. Graham Esler, as the General Chairman of the Convention the Curator of the Bank of Canada Money Museum, greeted us. After some food and drinks where served we had a tour of the museum. This lasted until around 8:30 P.M. when buses took us back to the hotel. About the same number of attendees participated as at the mint reception the night before.

The C.N.A. Club Delegates Breakfast was held at 8:00 A.M. on Saturday. Unfortunately there were only 15 people who turned out. This included C.N.A. Club Services Chairman Barry McIntyre, who chaired the meeting, President Tom Kennedy and Executive Secretary Ken Prophet. Representing the clubs were 3 people from Quebec City, location of the 2001convention, 4 people from Ontario representing the Scarborough and North York Coin Clubs and the London area. Another two people were there from Edmonton with one person from Calgary. The Vancouver area, where the convention will be held in 2002, was represented by one person. After the breakfast a round table discussion took place on "why more people don't turn out to this function of the convention".

Barry McIntyre, who moved last Octo-

ber, has had problems receiving the monthly bulletins from the various clubs. It seems that Canada Post has let him down in re-directing mail since the move. The direct result is there were no best club bulletin or regional bulletin awards presented at the convention this year because it was not felt that all bulletins to be considered had been received. This is very unfortunate since the North York bulletin was forwarded each month and would have been in the competition. The meeting lasted until 10:00 A.M.

At 10:30 A.M. the Annual General Meeting of the C.N.A. was held with a large turn out. The President mentioned that the auction had been very successful bringing in over \$10,000 in revenue to the C.N.A. When this is combined with other revenue and sponsor support, he declared the convention a financial success. This was followed with the awards session including display awards and the presenting of certificates to those C.N.A. members with 25, 30, 40 and 45 years of membership. I received both my 35 and 40 years certificates along with the North York Coin Club's 40-year certificate. The display Best of Show was saved for the banquet in the evening.

Saturday afternoon was very busy with meetings. This included the Canadian Association of Token Collectors, from noon to 1:30 P.M. at which the concept of circulation and collectible trade dollars was debated. Also starting at noon and running to 1:00 P.M. was the ANFC meeting. The Canadian Tire Coupon Collectors Club had their meeting from 1:30 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. that I was able to be present for the majority of. It included a spirited 95 lot auction featuring a particular 3-cent coupon with a re-

The C.N.A./N.E.S.A. Educational Forum was scheduled from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. but actually ran 30-minutes over time. James E. Charlton opened the five seminar sessions with some very worthwhile comments. The sessions included four individual presentations with

- Geoff Bell speaking on *Highlights in Canadian Numismatics During the Last Century*,
- Philip Carrigan giving A Review of Canadian Numismatic Research and the wealth of information in select auction catalogues,
- Ron Greene on *The Role of Medals in Canadian Numismatics* and
- Paul Berry on Canadian Paper Money and Its Significance In Numismatics.

The fifth and final session was a panel discussion on *Technology and Its Significance in Numismatics* with

- Jean-Pierre Tremblay, Vice-President of Manufacturing at the RCM
- H. Robert Campbell, President of the A.N.A.
- Brian Cornwell, President of I.C.C.S. and
- Wendell Wolka, Vice President of the Society of Paper Money Collectors.

An effort was made to record all of the sessions, so hopefully this material will be available some time to Clubs across the country. The Education Forum was so long that the number of people who sat through it from start to end was relatively small, but many people did stop in for sessions of specific interest, so attendance, overall, was very good. North York Coin Club member Paul Johnson was responsible for co-ordination and serving as moderator.

The bourse and exhibits room closed at 4:30 P.M. on Saturday. Attendance from the general public was not very good for all 3 days. I don't know if this was because the Congress Centre is located right downtown and that parking was \$7.00 and up for the day. I understand that the local TV stations did pro-

vide coverage.

The banquet was held on Saturday evening with over 120 people in attendance. Serge Pelletier was the master of ceremonies Mr. A. Trevor Hatch, a retired professor from Carleton University in Ottawa, was the guest speaker.

The Guy Potter Literary Award went to Wayne Jacobs, for his 4-part article on the pistarine in the Journal during 1999.

Two C.N.A. Fellow Awards were presented this year. The first went to Stanley Clute for his 50th anniversary book project. The second was presented to Ingrid Smith for her involvement in numismatics and the Torex show in Toronto. This is the first time a woman has been so honoured. Earlier this year, Ingrid turned the running of Torex over to her son Brian who helped this Club with cases during the recent ONA 2000 convention.

The Best of Show went to Ron Greene, of Victoria for his paper money display.

50 year members where then honoured with 2 clubs, the Toronto Coin Club and the City of Ottawa receiving their 50 year certificate. Following this, 8 regular members received their 50 year certificates: Jim Charlton, L.M.#6, Honorary President of the C.N.A.; Kenneth E. Bresset L.M.#46, (the only one from the U.S.); George Gray, #235; Leslie C. Hill, L.M.#3; David Moore, L.M.# 38; Jerry Remick, #128; Charles Taylor, #107, and Allan R. Townsend, #124.

All of the living Past President's where honoured with a package of the items unveiled at the book launched on the Thursday afternoon. The only one not in attendance was North York local member John Regitko who was prevented from attending at the last minute due to business problems at the flea market he manages.

The J. Douglas Ferguson Award went to Earl Salterio, of Calgary, for his involvement over the last 5 years on the 50th Anniversary Committee.

Since the convention wasn't held at a

hotel site, there was no in-suite C.N.A. President's reception after the banquet. Instead, the bar was kept open in the banquet room of the Congress Centre for about an hour after the banquet finished at 10:10 P.M.

With the convention officially closed on Saturday, the only function on Sunday was the CAWMC breakfast meeting and auction. About 20-25 stayed over for this event. Since Ron attended this function, I had everything packed to go when he got back to our hotel. We were on our way out of Ottawa shortly before 11:00 A.M. and stopped at Brockville to have lunch, making it back to Toronto around 4:00 P.M.

For your information 17 members of our club where at the convention including 6 members of the elected executive.

Next year's 2001 convention will be held in Quebec City from July 26 to 29. For the first time in 5 years it will include a Sunday bourse. The 2002 convention is set for Vancouver. The years 2003 and 2004 are open, but it has been decided Calgary will be the host in 2005 because it is the 100th anniversary of Alberta and Saskatchewan becoming provinces and entering Canadian confederation. They already have their committee formed for this convention now.
