Michael reminded many of the members of how they got started in the hobby when he mentioned that he loved to go through boxes of coins from the bank in his attempt to collect the lower denomination Canadian coins. After that solemn moment the club secretary, Henry Nienhuis, asked the members present if they had noticed any errors or omissions in the minutes of our October meeting as published in the November newsletter. No changes were identified; member Dr. Marvin Kay made a motion to accept the minutes as published, which was seconded by member Phillip Simms. Motion carried.

The next order of business was the Treasurer's report by Ben Boelens.

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After the treasurer's report Roger asked Phillip Simms to introduce our guest speaker the Rev. Lindsay King. Rev. King is a retired United Church Minister from Willowdale who is actively directing the Family Life Foundation, a charitable organization devoted to its members becoming fully functional human beings physically, mentally and spiritually. In this way the Rev. enjoys a significant Internet following.

The Rev. King introduced his audience to an old, somewhat worn, framed woodcut of the Roman Goddess Juno. He introduced this as his understanding and very first introduction of the term 'money.' Juno, the protector and special counsellor of the state, is often referred to by the title "Juno Moneta." From approximately 300 B.C. a temple dedicated to Juno Moneta also served as the Roman mint. The term 'moneta' is that Latin root of the word 'money.'

He mentioned that he had a collection of coins and other exonumia including coins of his birth place Newfoundland and that of his wife New Brunswick, a French Franc in Aluminum that he found on a bus while travelling in France, a gold Peso (37 grams of gold) from Mexico, and a wooden nickel issued by Mel Lastman.

We then touched on how money relates to Religion and the Bible. This subject raised a great deal of interest from the club members. According to the bible it is the love of money that is considered the root of all evil. The Rev. King delved into the story of the money changers in the temple. He asked if anyone in the audience was familiar with the story and its significance. According to member Andrew Silver, the Temple money changers were responsible for converting the wide variety of coinage in circulation into "temple currency." The exchange rate of the day was directly related to the weight of precious metals in the coin being exchanged. It was Andrew's understanding that the vendors in the temple were obligated to only accept "temple currency"; this is how the temple insured that they were receiving proper value for their products. It also forced the buyers to convert their coins through the money changers employed by the temple, in Jerusalem there were 300 such money changers. In the same way as banks and exchange bureaus do today, the money changers would make their income by charging a premium to the exchange rate. The Rev. King pointed out two of the weaknesses with system: since the average worker was not in control of what coinage they received in wages they were often disadvantaged by the exchange rates, some money changers

were not honest and would take advantage of their office. It was this injustice that led Jesus to upturn the tables of the money changers thus scattering their

Prompted by a question from Phillip Simms, the Rev. King moved on to the topic of the Toronto-Dollar (TD), a community dollar concept, which he has sponsored since 1998. It was launched by Mel Lastman on Dec. 5th, 1998 at the St. Lawrence Market. The official website torontodollar.com describes the TD as- "The Toronto Dollar is a Community Currency that encourages people to shop locally and reinvest in their community. Toronto Dollars are equal in value to Canadian dollars and are accepted nearly 150 independent Toronto businesses. 10% of every Toronto Dollar purchased goes directly to local non-profit agencies."

The Rev. King explained the concept as modern day barter dollars, a supplemental currency similar to an I-owe-you or gift certificate. In some ways he explained, modeled after the positive features of the ancient money changers.

How it works:

- Consumers exchange 1 Canadian dollar for 1-Toronto-dollar through participating organizations or at the Toronto Dollar booth at the St. Lawrence Market (open on Saturdays)
- You spend Toronto Dollars as you would Canadian dollars at participating businesses. There is a registration fee of \$25 for new businesses.
- The 10% solution: each time a Toronto Dollar is purchased from Toronto Dollar Inc, 90 cents is deposited in a reserve fund and 10 cents goes to the Toronto Dollar Community Projects Fund
- Businesses can spend the Toronto Dollars for services or products at other businesses, hire part-time staff or they can redeem their Toronto Dollars for 90 cents

The Toronto Dollar currency is printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company, using special paper, which includes security, measures against counterfeit printing.

Rev. King was a very entertaining and moving orator who thoroughly captured the attention of his audience. At the completion of his talk, club president, Bill O'Brien presented him with a certificate of appreciation.

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At 8:30 pm, Roger Fox called for a refreshment break; special thanks go to Bill O'Brien for preparing the refreshments.

After the break Roger resumed the business portion of the meeting.

Member Dr. Marvin Kay asked for the floor to make a short presentation on a Remembrance Day Medal set struck by the Royal Canadian Mint in 1996 titled "Canada Remembers." The set is housed in a 9x12" case with foldouts that talk about the medal set. Dr. Kay had the artfully struck set on display for the members to examine. The set consisted of 6 medals struck in bronze; 36.0 mm in diameter and each weighing 31.50 grams. The subject of each medallion highlights a portion of a painting selected from the Canadian War Museum collection.

Anniversary committee chairman Paul Petch asked for the floor to report on the status of the anniversary medal.

Paul had with him the lead splashes taken from the dies prior to them being hardened. He also mentioned that he had been in contact with Tony Arthur of the Mississauga Mint. Tony invited Paul and Henry to be there when during the First Strike on the medal so that it could be photographed. Paul also mentioned that as a special commemorative of the club's first meeting in the new community centre he was handing out a special gold coloured Edithvale Commemorative wood that the club had commissioned for the opening ceremony of the new building. This would be the only time this special coloured wood will be made available.

Secretary, Henry Nienhuis mentioned that he had two action items from the last executive meeting held Tuesday, November 9th, to bring to the attention of the membership. The first action item involved follow up of the next steps in forming the 2014 R.C.N.A convention committee. After summarizing the current status Henry asked that all members interested in volunteering to help out on the committee put their names forward so that he can send them an invitation to attend the forming meeting scheduled for January 11th, 2011. The intent of the meeting is to introduce the volunteers to the various aspects of hosting a prestigious convention like the R.C.N.A and to obtain feedback that will be used in the preparation of the official proposal that we will present to the R.C.N.A executive meeting to be held associated with the Winter TOREX in February. Paul Petch supported the discussion by relating experiences gained through the last convention sponsored by the club in 2004. He walked the sign-up sheet around the room. The executive was very gratified to see that 16 people had put their names forward.

The second action item dealt with proposed changes to the club's auction rules that were discussed and requested at the last club meeting. At that time, member Nick Cowan had requested that the executive investigate the possibility of adding support for a deferred payment mechanism. After the



topic was debated at the executive meeting, Henry was tasked with word-smithing the changes to bring to the members during the November meeting. After reading the proposed amendments to the auction rules at the meeting (see attachment) Henry asked for a motion from the floor to accept the amendments. Member Carl Anderson made the motion to accept the amendments, which was seconded by member David Quinlan. Motion carried.

Director David Quinlan asked for the floor to enquire the status of further changes he suggested to the club's auction rules. David had suggested that 1) the club consider holding a Dutch style auction for certain lots that the consignor previously indicates, and 2) the club consider holding a "big-ticket" auction once or twice a year in which special promotion will be used in order to entice prospective buyers to bid on more expensive items. Member Andrew Silver suggested that the "big-ticket" auction might be associated with a numismatic show and sale such as other clubs are sponsoring. The general feeling was that a show like this would be beneficial; there was concern expressed by a few members that it would be hard to find people willing to volunteer to work on such an event. Henry mentioned that other important criteria would be to find a date that did not coincide with other already established numismatic shows. It was decided to carry on the discussion at the January meeting.

The last portion of the meeting was devoted to Lucky Draws and Auction. Lucky Draw winners were- Carl Anderson (2), David Quinlan (2), Henry Nienhuis, Ben Boelens (2), Vince Chiappino, Norman G. Gordon, Italo Villella, Bob Velensky, Arie Yark (2), Tony Hine and Phillip Simms. The club earned \$38.00 through the sale of the draw tickets! The lucky draws were intermixed throughout the evening's auction, called by our expert auctioneer, Bob Porter, and guest runner, Jim Heifetz. Mark Argentino, auction manager, reported that receipts from the auction added \$17.05 to the club's coffers.

The club executive would like to thank the club members for supporting the club through the purchase of draw tickets and for draw prize donations. Please mention your donations to the club secretary so that your support can be recognized in the minutes and newsletter. The executive wishes to thank Lucille Colson for donating items including three coin banks, and Italo Villella for donating tokens to the lucky draw.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:40 p.m. A very full meeting indeed!

NORTH YORK COIN CLUB BY-LAWS AND AUCTION RULES

ARTICLE

- 1. Annual dues shall be set by the executive.
- 2. New members will be assessed the full year's dues and/or prorated if applicable at the discretion if the executive.
- 3. Meetings shall be called for the North York Coin Club at a time and place designated by the Executive Committee. All members will be notified if any change takes place in the time or place of future meetings. A meeting called the Annual Meeting shall be held each year at the January meeting.
- 4. A Nominating Committee shall be named by the President at the October meeting preceding an election year. The committee shall report at the November meeting at which time additional nominations may be made from the floor. Balloting if necessary shall take place at the December meeting and those elected shall retain office until their successors are elected.
- 5. The price of a bourse table at regular meetings to members and dealer members shall be at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
- 6. These By-Laws may be amended by a majority vote at any regular meeting, written copy of the amendment having been given to the secretary and read by him to the membership. Written notice shall be sent to all members and the amendment shall be voted on at the meeting immediately following the mailing of the said motion.

AUCTION RULES

- The Executive Committee will appoint an Auctioneer whose duty will be to whose duty it will be to call and sell the auction material and to ensure that all auctions are conducted in an orderly manner in accordance with auction rules.
- 2. The auctioneer may restrict the total number of lots in any auction to a maximum of sixty (60) and may restrict the number of lots submitted by any one member to eight (8) lots.
- 3. The auctioneer may refuse any lot submitted for auction if the material, in his opinion, is over graded or if it grades less than Fine except, in the case of a large lot or scarce material.
- 4. Only members in good standing for a period of three months or more may submit material for auction.
- 5. The auctioneer will collect 10% of the sale price of any lot and shall pay the monies so collected to the Treasurer.
- 6. No commission will be collected on lots not sold or bid in by the owner. At the discretion of the auctioneer, members repeatedly bidding in on their own material will be charged the regular 10% commission.
- 7. All lots submitted for auction shall be properly recorded on entry sheets, with the owner's name or membership number shown thereon.

- 8. No lot shall be delivered to a purchaser until it has been paid for in full unless the consignor is willing to accept deferred payment.
- Members, whose lots are sold in the auction, shall be paid at the conclusion of the auction when the auctioneer is satisfied that auction finances are balanced, unless the consignor has agreed to the deferred payment option.
- 10. For lots of value in excess of \$10.00, as determined by the hammered bid, the buyer has the option to request that the consignor accept a deferred payment. If the consignor agrees to accept this option, the buyer and seller will then make arrangements to conclude the sale at a latter time. In all cases both parties agree to honour the transaction. If for any reason either party refuses to complete the transaction said party is liable for penalty under Section 16 of the NYCC Constitution. In all circumstances the Buyer will remit the commission incurred by the sale to the club at the time of auction.
- 11. Club members or their guests may purchase lots offered for sale in the auctions.

The Constitution and By-Laws were approved Feb. 19th 1960; Amended January, 25th 1977; Amended November 23rd 2010.

CANADA TOPS FIRST COTY VOTE

Here is an update on our story in the October issue about Coins of the Year

None of the five U.S. coins nominated for the 2011 Coin of the Year Awards survived the first round of balloting.

Ninety-three coins issued by mints world-wide were nominated for the award that honors coins issued in 2009. Judges picked winners in 10 categories. From these, they will select a Coin of the Year winner.

The public will join in the process by selecting a People's Choice Award winner from a field comprised primarily of the category winners. Visit www.numismaster.com to vote.

Topping the first round of COTY voting was the Royal Canadian Mint, with two winners. Its \$300 Native American Summer Moon Mask gold piece won in the Most Artistic category, while the Crystal Snowflake silver \$20 beat out the competition to win the Best Silver Coin designation.

Initially France also triumphed in two categories, but because one nomination ended up being dated 2010 rather than 2009, it was disqualified and will be considered for next year's award. Monnaie de Paris won the Best Contemporary Event Coin for the silver 10 euro marking the 20th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall.

The National Bank of Kazakhstan won the Most Historically Significant Coin honors with a silver 100 tenge commemorating Attila the Hun.

The Best Gold Coin winner comes from the South African Mint. It is a gold 100 rand for the white rhino. The Mint of Finland's Peace and Security silver 20 euro was named Best Crown by the judges.

Taking the title of Most Popular coin is the 10-euro silver coin of the Austrian Mint for a piece featuring the Basilisk of Vienna, a monstrous creature of legend that was part snake, toad and cockerel.

Slovakia's first 2-euro circulating coin struck and issued when it joined the euro zone won the Best Trade Coin category.

Winner of Most Innovative Coin honors was the British Indian Ocean Territory's 2-pound silver and crystal Life of the Sea Turtle coin from Pobjoy Mint.

Named Most Inspirational Coin is a 10 zlotch silver piece from the Mint of Poland honoring the World War II Polish underground resistance to Nazi occupation.

COTY Awards are sponsored by World Coin News, a sister publication to Numismatic News.

Judges will wrap up their voting in early December while participants voting for the People's Choice Award will have until Jan. 2, 2011 to cast their online vote.

The 2011 COTY Awards will be given January 29, 2011, at the World Money Fair in Berlin, Germany.

IRELAND HONOURS PAST COINAGE WITH A NEW SERIES

The first ever silver crown coin series to be issued from the Central Bank of Ireland was launched on October 13, 2010. The newly launched series highlights the images of animals that have appeared on the nation's coins since Ireland's independence in 1921.

The new series will consist of three crown size silver proof coins which will include as the main feature, the designs from the original set of the well known and much loved Percy Metcalfe circulation coins first issued in 1928. The addition of the animal's offspring symbolizes the next generation of Ireland's present currency, the EURO which at only eleven years old, is still technically in its infancy. The new series is the work of Emmet Mullins. Emmet describes how he approached the task of replicating the iconic Metcalfe designs whilst adding the element of a new generation.

"The original coins show the animals in profile and were quite basic anatomical depictions. This is still the case, but with the Horse coin, we see the foal casually looking towards us in a more relaxed pose." Emmett will also design the other two coins in the series. The second coin to be issued in 2011 will feature

the Salmon, seen originally on the two shilling coin and last, the Irish Wolfhound, which was depicted on the six pence coin, will be issued in 2012."

Percy Metcalfe the Artist

Ireland originally featured a group of farm yard animals on their circulation coins, which made their debut in 1928 after a two year consultation of a committee made up of prominent persons whose task it was to decide what the country's coins should look like. The considerable importance of agriculture in the Irish economy was the main reason for the choice of motif. One specific set of designs stood out among the many hundreds submitted. These were the work of Percy Metcalfe, at the time a thirty-one year old artist who had submitted eight animal designs as the brief had described. In 1926, the committee responsible for the introduction of Ireland's new coins, coincidentally chose all of the un-named designs submitted by Metcalfe for the denominations and they eventually made up all the circulation coins issued, from the farthing to the half crown.



Metcalfe's work did not just include this Irish coin series, he also designed the prestigious George Cross in 1940, and in particular, the portrait of H.M. King George VI which appears on the obverse of the award. He was involved in the design of the Great Seal of the Realm of the United Kingdom. He designed a portrait of H.M. King George V which was used on the obverse of the 1935 commemorative Dollar of Canada. The Irish series was the inspiration for placing animals on Canadian coins in 1937.


