CoinProject.COM — An Impressive Co-operative Project

The following is edited from postings on the Moneta-L web site, which is dedicated to the study of ancient coins.

COINPROJECT.COM

Alfredo De La Fe:

Almost a year ago I posted my original request for help with a new numismatic research website. Coin Project is now open to the public at http://coinproject.com as a public beta.

Imagine a website:

- Which has been a collaborative effort of 35+ dealers, collectors and scholars, some of which are among the greatest numismatic minds of our day.
- Which is non-commercial (will be funded by donations and banner ads) and has a board of advisors comprised of collectors, scholars and dealers to ensure that access will always be free and unrestricted
- Which is moderated by specialists and collectors and where literally hundreds can volunteer to help manage an area in which they share an interest
- Where anyone can contribute coins from their collection or inventory for consideration to be included in the database
- That has tens of thousands, with the potential for millions of coins listed with all of the data broken out and fully searchable.
- Where legends are actually in the alphabet used (For now Latin and Greek, but electronic java based keyboards in Hebrew, Phoenician, Arabic and other alphabets are planned) and can be searched in those languages
- Where errors can be reported directly to the numismatic experts moderating the category
- Where anyone can easily create their own personal website to share their collection with others and where anyone can have their own personal numismatic blog

The purpose of the site is to promote and facilitate numismatic study and research. We welcome as many examples of any given type as users are willing to submit. This allows numismatists that wish to do a die study or in the case of scarce or rare coins which have incomplete legends visible the ability of studying partial legends on several coins.

What I feel makes CoinProject unique and of great value is:

- It is a true collaborative effort. In the case of Wildwinds, it was Dave Surber doing all of the work. With CP we currently have just over 100 volunteers and have the potential of **thousands**. We are not trying to replace Wildwinds or CoinArchives. These sites are incredibly valuable tools. Our goals are a little different and our "roadmap" of features we have either started work on or would like to implement is rather long.
- Users, dealers and institutions can submit their own collections (or I would be glad to help them do so) either manually or in bulk. They can also create their own private website where they can create their own categories and organize their coins as they see fit.
- We have a multi-step verification/moderation process. Every coin must be quickly checked and edited for obvious mistakes or issues in data entry or uniformity to be approved and the next step is where a specialist that has experience in a particular field "verifies" the coin by comparing the photograph against the data entered and then confirming the reference citations by physically opening the reference work.
- We have made it easy for users to submit error reports with a link on every submission. If an error is submitted an email is sent to the moderator(s) of the specific region/city/issuer/type and they are able to address the problem and close out the "ticket" which generates a reply to the person that submitted the error report via email.

The above and much more has become a reality. For more than a year this site has been in active development and is currently in "beta." We now need volunteers to help us do the following:

- Submit coins from their collections and/or inventory for inclusion into the database and help us "test" the site
- 2. Experts in specific numismatic fields of interest with the appropriate reference works and knowledge to volunteer as moderators. (Moderators can be assigned to each City for Greek and Roman Provincial as well as Issuers for Roman Imperial, Celtic, etc.) Moderators manage the area they have been assigned and "Verify" accuracy of submitted records by checking all of the data against cited references.
- 3. Help us to "chop up" (parse) comma separated files of coin records which have been submitted using Excel so that we have less work to do when the time comes to approve and verify these records (We have close to 10,000 such records)
- Ensure that the Legend fields only have legends and include the full legends (must review the obverse and reverse description fields)
- 5. Clean up the reference citations (remove page numbers when appropriate, ensure that the reference citation is on a single line, etc.)
- 6. Put the reference citations in an appropriate order.
- 7. Approve the record.

Look up the coin in any major reference works for the series which are not cited.

Some stats as of 3/16/2010:

- 19,150 records which have been approved and are "live" for study and which can be accessed via the search engine
- 150,000+ records pending, which will be uploaded for editing, approval and verification

The project is a data-driven web site developed by professional programmers with the support of over 100 volunteer numismatists, many of them the best in their fields. The result is an easily updatable, expandable and searchable resource that already contains nearly 40,000 coin records (with an additional 300,000+ pending). Refining and standardizing issuers, regions and cities for each type is a high priority; the site will have the most comprehensive and accurate set of these classifications to be found anywhere.

As a not-for-profit collaborative effort, Coin Project will rely on financial support by selling banner advertising and private donations. Coin Project will never charge a fee to use any of its resources. Strategic guidance is provided by a board of advisors with day-to-day management decisions made by a project executive.

There is still much work to be done, such as the editing and approving of a huge number of pending submissions from individuals, major institutions and commercial sources. For this work we require more volunteers and, now that the site is maturing, is a good time for new volunteers to join and contribute.

Please visit the website at http://coin-project.com and give us your comments. If you feel you can contribute some time toward processing the images and data, let me know and I'll arrange credentials and provide you with more details on the inner workings of the project.

Having seen the beta test version of this project, I can attest that it is a very ambitious and promising venture. What makes the massive scope actually seem achievable is the fact that so many capable people are involved. I wish Alfredo and those working with him the best of luck with this effort and will personally assist wherever possible.

Carl Zipfel:

For those of you who have not checked out Coinproject.com I strongly suggest that you take a few moments and do so. This is probably the largest numismatic undertaking currently in progress. Oh, and did I mention, It is free.

Once you have looked at the enormity of it, take a moment to consider being a volunteer. Coinproject.com is a free research web site dedicated to coins, all coins. This site will be a repository for images, and data, on all coins, ancient, near-ancient, modern, Greek, Roman, Byzantine, Celtic, Chinese, British, USA, Peruvian, etc. It is free, and by charter plans to remain free. It is staffed only by volunteers. So as you can imagine it needs a lot of volunteers. Current volunteers come from all levels of numismatics. Coinproject.com has noted numismatists, numismatic scholars, authors, and knowledgeable amateurs like me.

Tom Mullally

It has been a three year labor of love. The dedicated volunteers have put in countless hours creating and testing the site to make sure it functions as planned. Sure there are still a few small bugs to work out, but we are very proud of what's been created so far.

We have the largest Parthian database, Roman Provincial and Greek lists far superior to the Princeton list (and separated into separate Greek and provincial lists, a task other websites won't touch), and the largest moneyer's list of Roman Republican coins. Our Islamic list is far superior to any website available and our medieval list will be unequaled. Our German States list is already 4000 issuers strong. Some of the categories are not yet finished, since this is still a work in progress, but most categories are quite thorough. Of course, there's still a lot to do, but I'm very happy with the direction we're headed.

So far, we have been focused on functionality, not aesthetics. The website needs a little touch up, and will be getting it soon, but the lists function as designed.

Now we need your help. We can always use experts and seasoned collectors' help to make the site better. Please visit the site and take it for a test drive. Let us know what you think.

PARKS CANADA 100th Anniversary

The Royal Canadian Mint has announced that its first collector coin of the year, the 2011 Silver Dollar, is dedicated to celebrating the 100th anniversary of Parks Canada.


"One hundred years ago, Canada became the first country in the world to create a service entirely dedicated to the protection of national parks. The year ahead will be a time for Canadians to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Parks Canada and our country's international leadership in protecting and presenting our collective heritage," said Alan Latourelle, CEO of Parks Canada.

Designed by Quebec artist Luc Normandin, the rich imagery of this coin evokes Parks Canada's role in conserving Canada's flora and fauna. The press release stated that four endangered ecological treasures are cradled in the hands of a young Canadian: a Whooping Crane (Grus americana), the Southern Maidenhair Fern (Adiantum capillus-veneris), a Western Fringed Prairie Orchid (Platanthera praeclara) and a Kentucky Coffee Tree (Gymnocladus dioicus).

Subsequent newspaper reports have countered this stating that the fern is actually common in the United States and that it does not actually grow within the boarders of any park. The orchid on the other hand is globally rare, being found in only in a few wet areas of south eastern Manitoba, but not within a national park.

RCM spokesman Alex Reeves counters that the Mint is aware of this, "But that's not the point," he said. "The coin is intended to recognize the parks' role in protecting endangered wildlife, and it doesn't matter where the individual examples come from."

Planned mintage for the coin is 40,000.



WATERCRAFT ON WORLD COINS

BOOK REVIEW BY MARVIN KAY, MD, NYCC #400

WATERCRAFT ON WORLD COINS, VOLUME II AMERICA AND ASIA, 1800-2008

(Published by the Alpha Press – Great Britain, USA, Canada)

The first thing I did when I got my hands on Dotan's Watercraft Volume II was to turn to the section on Canada to see how he described our famous voyageur silver dollar. He devotes a page and a half to our iconic dollar coin, with detailed descriptions of the voyageur, the aboriginal guide, the rays of the aurora borealis and the rocky island in the background with the wind-swept pines.

(He even includes a footnote about the disappearance of the voyageur dies that were supposed to have been used for the aureate circulating dollar coin. The loss of these dies forced the Royal Canadian Mint to use a backup design to produce the dollar coin known as the 'loonie.')

Yossi Dotan is described as a *numisnau-tical* researcher. He has collected 'ship coins' for over thirty years. Since his retirement as an accountant he has done extensive research on ships on coins and written the appropriate narratives.


Dotan's attention to detail is evident in the descriptions of nearly every coin in the book.

For the numismatist, he writes about the coin's size, metallic content and year (or years) of issue. For the mariner, he provides details about the ship's size, function, history, destination, and, in some cases, the ultimate fate of the vessel.

Even if the ship is only a tiny part of the coin's design, we get a detailed description. For example, the Caribbean island of Dominica has its coat of arms on the four-dollar coin dated 1970. In this case, the ship is a small native craft in the lower left quadrant of the shield. You almost have to look twice to find the ship.

All types of sailing vessels have been described on coins, from Noah's Ark (Israel) to the Titanic (North Korea), from a rowboat (USA) to a large ocean liner (Bermuda), from an Olympic catamaran (Aruba) to a three-masted in full sail (China, among others).

Dotan has incorporated several improvements in Volume II. There are about 500 coin photos, more than twice as many as in Volume I. He has three pages of 'Additions and



Corrections' to Volume I. Also there is an extensive index and bibliography.

The only typos that eluded his proofreaders were his description of coins from the British Antarctic Territory. These coins mark the 100st (sic) Anniversary of the Declaration of British Sovereignty in the area.

This book will appeal to the casual topical collector, to the dedicated numismatist and to the naval historian. I look forward to Dotan's *Volume III, Africa and Oceania, 1800-2011*, which is in preparation.

COINS FOUND BENEATH BLUENOSE II MASTS

Sailors have long believed a coin under the mast brings luck. This ritual is believed to have started with the Romans, whose custom it was to place a coin in the mouth of a dead person to pay Charon. This was the boatman who ferried the souls of the dead across the River Styx to Hades, which they believed to be the home of the dead. Sceptics of the superstition should note that even the U.S. Navy takes this ritual seriously. Officers of the USS New Orleans, launched in 1933, placed 33 coins — pennies, nickels, and dimes —under her foremast and mainmast . . . all carefully placed heads up. You don't need to use rare or expensive coins. In fact, in the days of wooden ships, when skilled artisans earned comparatively little, it was regarded as imprudent to use gold. Rather, they would select a coin that meant something to them: one that was minted in the year the boat was launched perhaps; or one from the year they were born.



Bringing this up to modern times and giving it a Canadian context, the famous Bluenose shown on our Canadian tencent denomination and the 1929 stamp, was rebuilt in 1963 and named Bluenose II. As a part of its construction, coins were placed under its foremast and mainmast. Now the Bluenose II is being reconstructed and restored and these coins were recovered in

July 2010 as the project began. They are currently on display in Lunenburg at the Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic in the Bluenose Room.

Among coins on display are a 1963 Canadian 1-5-10-cent and silver dollar, 1967 silver dollar, 1981 nickel dollar, a 2007 \$200 gold Fishing Trade commemorative, a town of Lunenburg trade dollar struck for the town's 225th anniversary in 1978, two Bluenose II commemorative tokens, a Spanish 8 Reale (Piece of Eight), a gold doubloon dated 1791 and a 1997 Canada/Russia 25th anniversary silver dollar.

Some of these coins will be placed back under the masts when restoration is complete. This is scheduled for the spring of 2012, in time for the tourist season.

The New British Coinage

Early in December the official "Gazette" published a proclamation by the King in which was determined the new designs for the gold and bronze coins. Following the numismatic rule, the profile on the obverse is reversed facing to the left instead of to the right as in the case of the King Edward VII coinage. The inscription on the reverse will read, "Georgius V., Dei Gra: Britt: Onin: Rex Fid: Def: Ind: Imp:" The figure of St. George slaying the dragon and the date in the exergue will be retained.

The bronze coins will be of three values as heretofore; penny, halfpenny and farthing, and the seated figure of Britannia will adorn the reverse.

The five-pound and two-pound pieces, which are to be struck in connection with the new coinage, will form a special coronation

issue. Only a limited number will be issued, and the coins are not intended for general circulation. They will be on sale to the general public at their face value at the Bank of England during the coronation period, and the majority are expected to be purchased by souvenir hunters and coin collectors. Although not meant for ordinary circulation, the coin can be legally tendered in the same way as other coins. Special proof sets will be kept at the Royal Mint and in gold cases at an extra charge of twenty per cent above their face value.

Mr. Bertram Mackennal, A. R. A., who has been appointed to design and model the Coronation medal and the coinage for the new reign, is an Australian who was born in Melbourne in 1863.

Alfred Sandham Obituary

On Sunday, December 25, Albert Sandham, the Canadian antiquarian, died at his residence, 88 Baldwin Street, Toronto.

Mr. Sandham was in his seventy-third year, and while not an active collector for many years he was well known to the older generations of numismatics.

In 1869 appeared his book entitled *The Coins, Tokens and Medals of the Dominion of Canada*, and this was followed by a supplement in 1872.
