PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

These are the hottest, driest days of the year where according to legend the rising of the Dog Star, Sirius, in the morning sky, coincides with the time of year where events get stagnant or marked by dull lack of progress. This must be true in my household when I look at my to do list that grow longer by the week but it is definitely not true in the stock market or, more specifically, the gold market.

The last few years the prices of precious metals, and other metals used in the striking of planchets used in coinage, has created a situation for a lot of coins that the melt value is more than the face value. This has made many of us long term coin collectors gold and silver speculators.

It was only yesterday that gold was \$1600.00 an ounce, or sorry that was Monday. It was only yesterday that gold was \$1700.00 an ounce, or sorry that was Tuesday. It was only yesterday that gold was \$1800.00 an ounce, or sorry that was Wednesday. Who knows where it will be by the time you are reading this!

You get my drift. Your coin collection, with all those old silver coins tarnishing in that sock drawer, are now worth about \$18.00 face. For those of you who have a few old gold coins kicking around you are even luckier.

You know, I asked myself, who in the world is buying gold at these ever-increasing

prices. So I went to where everyone who wants to know something goes: their wife. When she didn't know, for only the second time since we were married, I decided to go to Google. It told me that the list of buyers is long. This year alone Thailand has purchased 26 tonnes of the golden wonder while Russia has bought 42, Mexico 99, South Korea 25. Now the heavy weights like Iran 300, Central banks 203 and China 450 in 2010. But the biggest of the big are ETF's where it is not unusual for funds to purchase a million ounces in a given day. ETS's now hold 1325 tonnes of gold, that's 42.6 million ounces. These purchases are only a few of the reported transactions. On the other side of the ledger is the supply. The total gold production since the beginning of time only amounts to 5.3 billion ounces.

So the answer is obvious. We, the informed coin collectors, are selling are collections to informed bullion dealers who in turn pay us with the fiat money we have in our wallets. MEETING NEWS OF THE JULY 2011 MEETING

The 567th meeting of the North York Coin Club was held on Tuesday, July 26th, 2011 in the Gibson room at the Edithvale Community Centre, 131 Finch Ave. West.

Our President, Bill O'Brien, hammered the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. in the chair. There were 20 members and 4 guests in attendance.

The on-time attendance draw was the first order of business. Member Ben Boelens' name was drawn. Ben was present to collect his prize of \$8.00 and then very kindly announced that he was donating his winnings to the club. The prize will reset to \$2.00 for the August 23rd meeting. A well-deserved thank-you goes to Ben for donating his winnings.

Henry asked the members present if they had noticed any errors or omissions in the minutes of our June meeting as published in the July newsletter. There being no changes noted, Norman G. Gordon made a motion to accept the minutes as published. Member Nick Cowan seconded this. Motion carried.

The next order of business was to hear the Treasurer's report delivered by our Treasurer Ben Boelens.

Henry Nienhuis took a moment to mention that today was the birthday of the club's oldest member. He reminded the members present that James E. Charlton was celebrating his 100th birthday today; a very special event indeed! Mr. Charlton recently attended the RCNA Convention at Windsor and celebrated his birthday, albeit a little prematurely, with the RCNA members attending the convention. The Windsor coin club, host of this year's convention, presented Mr. Charlton with a very special birthday cake in the shape of the new \$100 polymer note sporting his likeness. Kim Filiault, the wife of Windsor Coin Club member Jody Filiault, artfully executed the cake. On a more personal note, the North York coin club in conjunction with the Toronto

coin club presented Mr. Charlton, our life member #9, with a framed certificate at the RCNA general meeting.

Paul Petch stood to make a motion from the floor, that *the North York Coin Club members send their very best wishes on the occasion of Mr. James E. Charlton's 100th birthday.* The motion was seconded by Norman G. Gordon and carried to a standing ovation from all members present!

Moving on to pending business, Bill asked Paul Petch for an update on the status of the proposed collectible show to be held jointly with the Mississauga-Etobicoke club. Paul mentioned previously that the room at the Edithvale Community Centre was available for the Saturday, September 10th date and would cost a total of \$320.00 plus taxes. He mentioned that the MECSCC club had sold 8 dealer tables and that (largely because of the significant overlap in the memberships) the NYCC had only sold 4 tables. He further mentioned that at this level the clubs would stand to lose \$80.00 unless we could sell 4 more tables.

One concern mentioned was the show was essentially unknown. Nick suggested that one possibility would be to advertise the show in the North York Mirror newspaper. Paul Petch and others thought that perhaps it was just too late to advertise the show for the pending September date. Paul made the recommendation that based on the current circumstances; we postpone the show until a later time in October or December. Terry O'Brien made the observation that others such as John Regitko had mentioned that September was a bad time for him, however said he would take multiple tables if the show was later. LEATHER MONEY

Following a leather piece being offered in last month's auction, we present this short article from *The Numismatist* of July 1911:

The Lacedaemonians used leather as currency, and Plato states that the Carthaginians employed leather money in his day, and that it was probably the earliest currency of that people. These citations, however, probably refer to the skins of various animals, and the stamped leather which it is claimed was used by the Romans before the introduction of a copper coinage by Numa Pompilius was perhaps an entire skin or pelt rather than a distinctive coin.

There is no doubt, however, that in more modern times nations have adopted a leather coinage which frequently served the function of necessity money, and which was made redeemable for a metallic currency. In the year 1241 the Emperor Frederick II issued leather coins when he was besieging Faenza for seven months, and these were later exchanged for gold Augustan which had the

value of one and a quarter gold gulden. The coins issued by the Emperor contained his portrait impressed in silver on the leather.

More than a century earlier, i.e. in 1124, Dominicus Michiel, duke of Venice issued obsidional coins of leather cut from horsehides for the beleaguered city of Tyrus. This coin received the name of "Michieletta" from its originator. In 1360, John II., King of France, authorized the making of small leather coins with small golden threads sewn or stamped upon them; this he was compelled to do as his treasury was depleted on account of a ransom of three million livres paid to the English nation. Stamped leather coins were issued by Leyden in 1574, when the city was besieged by the Spaniards under Valdez; they bore as a device three shields and a stag, with the letters S. M. and H. S.

The Russians at an early period used skins of animals for currency and later they employed irregular discs and strips of leather rudely stamped. The word "rouble" is derived from the verb *roobet*, to cut, and some varieties of Russian copper money are called

"portly," from *poul*, leather; these words are probably derived from the primitive leather currency in use in that country. *Vide* an exhaustive paper on this subject contributed by William Charlton to the *British Numismatic Journal* (iii. 310).

Interest in leather money has recently been revived from the fact that last year (1910) a roll of circular leather tokens were discovered in the archives of the market at Aschbach on the Danube in upper Austria. These tokens bore the crest of Philip Eder of the guild of masons and stone-cutters at Eferding (near Aschbach) and the date 1804. Leather strips were also found from which these tokens were cut. Mr. Franz Hirmann, the founder of the museum at Aschbach, has discovered among the records that at the time of the French occupation the masons and stoneworkers were employed by the French in the construction of entrenchments, and were paid by the master of the guild with these leather coins, which represented the value of one groschen.


