NEWS OF THE OCTOBER 2019 MEETING

The 659th meeting of the North York Coin Club was held on Tuesday, October 22, 2019 in the 1st floor Banquet Room at the Edithvale Community Centre. Our President, Bill O'Brien, was in the chair with 22 members and 3 guests in attendance when he hammered the meeting to order at 7:33 p.m.

Member Jared Stapleton was present at the time his name was drawn to receive the on-time attendance draw prize of \$5.00. The draw will reset to \$5.00 for the November 26, 2019, meeting.

Bill led the membership in a moment of silence in remembrance of Harry Booth, long-time collector and dealer from the Orillia area, who passed away on November 19.

Bill asked the members present if they had noticed any errors or omissions in the minutes of the September meeting, as published. With no errors identified, Norm Belsten made a motion to accept the minutes as printed, which was seconded by Carl Anderson. Motion carried. Bill O'Brien in his capacity as Treasurer gave a short finance report.

The members were reminded of our Holiday meeting on December 10 and the fact that we are now collecting money (\$35 per person, tax and gratuity included). We then talked about the fact that next year will be the club's 60th anniversary and that we need to consider plans to celebrate it accordingly. After considerable discussion the following

main ideas were considered: an Anniversary Dinner (similar to what was held for our 50th anniversary) with special guest speaker; perhaps holding a Game Night; and striking a medal to commemorate the event. There was very little support for making a medal, although the possibility of counter-stamping a coin or medal with a special anniversary punch was to be explored. Bill also noted that the receipt from the club's donation to CAFNE would be part of the evening's auction event.

Bill then asked if anyone brought show-and-tell items. Dick Dunn showed a volume of the book published by Interpol as a guide for detecting counterfeit currency. According to Dick a volume is published for Coins and for Banknotes. Dick had the banknote portion.

The next item on the agenda was the presentation by Tony Hine on his trip to the American Numismatic Association Convention in Rosemont, Illinois. Tony's talk was centred on anecdotes of his experiences attending various events. He mentioned the huge bourse with 1,000 plus dealers, is free admission to 10 year+ members. He attended the Numismatic Literary Guild's annual luncheon presentation which this year featured Numismatist Editor Barbara Gregory who is retiring this year. He also mentioned meeting Mel Wacks who is the current president of the American Israel Numismatic Association.

A short refreshment break was called from 8:10–8:30 p.m.

We resumed the meeting with our regular auction and our customary lucky draw. Lucky draw numbers were called at various times while the auction took place. Lucky draw winners for the evening were—Keith Schengili-Roberts (2), Philip Tran (2), Andrew Silver, Franco Farronato, Tony Hine, and Carl Anderson (4). The club earned \$28.00 through the sale of the draw tickets! Our auction manager, Paul Johnson, reported that receipts from the auction added \$21.70 plus another \$79.00, from donated material, to the club coffers. We thank Dick Dunn, our auctioneer, Philip Tran and Andrew Silver, who volunteered as runners, and Paul Johnson, our auction manager, for their help.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

ALFRED SANDHAM AND CANADA'S FIRST COIN CATALOGUE


It would be an unfortunate oversight to miss giving recognition on this, the 150th anniversary of Canada's first coin catalogue, which was published early in 1869 by Alfred Sandham.

It had been an important project of the Numismatic Society of Montreal, when it was established in 1862, to produce a catalogue of the coinages of the various colonies that made up British North America. This was partially accomplished one year later with *A Catalogue of the Silver and Copper Coins of Canada*. Unfortunately, the project stalled at 16 pages when the committee working on the book disbanded. It was not until 1869 under the group's new name, the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal, that Alfred Sandham, serving as secretary at the time and single handed, published *Coins, Tokens and Medals of The Dominion of Canada*. This stood as the only purely Canadian numismatic reference work until 1886 when Robert Wallace McLachlan's *A Descriptive Catalogue of Coins, Tokens and Medals Issued in and Relating to the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland* appeared.

Sandham's work is well illustrated and includes in its 72 pages an introduction and sections on the coinage of Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Magdalen Island, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, the Province of Canada, plus groupings of miscellaneous and doubtful coins as well as medals.

Some background on Alfred Sandham appears in *Canadian Men & Women of the Time* edited by Henry James Morgan and William Briggs of Toronto in 1898. They note "Sandham, author and numismatist, was born in Montreal, November 19, 1838, and educated at private schools in that city. When very young he left home to take a situation in N. Y. On his return he entered the service of the Montreal Telegraph Co., and was subsequently in that of the Grand Trunk Railway. A change in his religious views led to his appointment as General Secretary of the Y.M.C.A., with headquarters at Montreal. He held this position for 10 years, and whilst holding it employed his leisure in literary work.

Among Mr. Sandham's publications are: "*Ville Marie; or, Montreal, Past and Present*," a work which will always be valuable for its painstaking research; "*Coins, Tokens and Medals of Canada*," the pioneer work on Canadian numismatics, and several interesting historical and numismatic works published chiefly for private circulation. Among these, some of which are now exceedingly rare, are: "*McGill College*

and its Medals," "*Medals Commemorative of the Visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada*," "*Historic Medals of Canada*," "*The Trade Tokens of Montreal*" and "*Montreal and its Fortifications*." All are illustrated. Mr. Sandham also originated the Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal, of which he was for over 2 years the chief editor, the greater portion of the material used, and the illustrations, being prepared by him personally. In 1880 he removed to Toronto at the request of the Y.M.C.A., and for 4 years fulfilled the secretarial duties of the Association in that city."

A review of Sandham's book by Charles E. Anthon appeared in the May 1869 issue of the American Journal of Numismatics. He first praised the book in the writing style of the time, and then went on to criticize what he saw as its many errors. Here is a short sample of the praise.

"We hail with unfeigned pleasure the birth of this firstling of Canadian Numismatology, and congratulate our right worthy brother of Montreal on the final advent of the offspring with which his brain has so long been travailing. There is a sure, though, it may be, not very magnificent or extensive species of immortality secured by a work like this to its author. His fame is like that of the first colonist of a new territory. Whatever those who come after him may accomplish, his labours will always be recognized as the groundwork of a structure interesting to those whom it may concern. He is entitled, indeed, to incorporate thenceforward into his own production all the additions and improvements which unfriendly criticism no less than friendly aid may furnish; and, perfecting the result through successive issues from the press, he leaves to a little circle for all future time the reputation of a *Virtuoso*, not a valiant man necessarily, as in the Roman sense, nor yet a virtuous man necessarily, as in the Italian, but in plain English, one of refined tastes, and cravings not vulgar. To describe satisfactorily any Canadian piece, either for a public sale or a private cabinet, it will henceforth suffice to refer to 'Sandham' by the Title and Number under which the piece appears."

I will spare you any more; the good fellow was just getting warmed up.

Originals of the catalogue are quite rare and can be expensive. Fortunately, the Canadian Numismatic Publishing Institute out of Winnipeg produced a reprint in 1964, now available in the \$40-\$50 range. There are also print on demand services that will produce a copy for as little as \$25.

MEDALLIC IMAGES ON SOME CURRENT CANADIAN COINS

As a big fan and collector of art medals, it is a striking design that first attracts me. I then enjoy the experience of holding the medal and appreciating its tactile qualities. I have written before about Dora de Pédery-Hunt's advice to warm the medal in your hand as you feel the relief and, in so doing, allow the medal to become alive for you.

Annually the Royal Canadian Mint produces a few circulating commemorative coins, but these designs are insignificant to the number of coin products that are offered to collectors. It occurred to me that both the circulating coins and mint products offer some outstanding and attractive designs: the work of respected Canadian artists. Unlike circulating coins, the Mint products have a lustrous finish and are not intended to be handled as Dora suggests. This is of small concern because the Mint strikes all coins with a fairly low relief compared to that of an art medal. Nonetheless, the thought remains, "How would some of these designs look as an art medal?"

As we come to the end of 2019 and all the circulating coins and mint products for the year have been released, I have done a review of all the designs and selected the ones that could stand on their own and be rendered as art medals. Some of the mint products have only a colourful image printed on the smooth coin surface; these offerings I immediately bypassed. Others had extra elements such as stones or glass images affixed after they were struck. These were also disqualified.

What remains are insightful and inspirational designs presented in the chronological order of their release. I can easily imagine a medallist artist carefully sculpting any one of these in high relief, ready for the foundry. Of course, the artist would not be compelled to include CANADA, a date or a denomination on the finished design, so I will leave it to you to remove such inscriptions in your mind's eye as you view these selections.

January

*2019 \$100 14-Karat Gold Coin—
75th Anniversary of The Normandy Campaign—
D-Day at Juno Beach by Glen Loates*

On June 6, 1944, 14,000 Canadians stepped forward and fought to secure a beachhead on an 8-km stretch of Normandy coast. Many fell before reaching the shore; still, the brave Canadians pushed on, advancing farther than any of the Allies and clearing the way for the invading forces that followed.



February

*2019 \$125 Fine Silver Coin—
The Benevolent Dragon by Chris and Rosina Reid of Three Degrees Creative Group*

The benevolent dragon of Chinese tradition brings powerful blessings. This is why he is so attracted to the pearl, which he clutches in his claws or under his chin—a perfect sphere of wisdom, energy, and longevity. Traditional Chinese images often depict magical dragons chasing or holding a pearl that is sometimes glowing with flames. Associated with *Qi* energy, from which all creation flows, as well as with natural elements like the sun, the moon, thunder, and the egg, the pearl pulses with life and potential. Together, the dragon and the pearl generate a powerful, complex symbolism dealing with deep concepts such as truth and enlightenment.

*2019 \$1 Canadian Circulation Coin—
Equality by Joe Average*

Over the last five decades, Canada has made significant strides in becoming a more inclusive society, guided by a belief in diversity, equality for all and the right to live free from discrimination, regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression or sex characteristics. On April 23rd, 2019 this coin commemorates 50 years since Canada took the first step towards decriminalizing homosexuality.

**2019 \$3 Fine Silver Coin—
*Queen Elizabeth Rose by Claudio D'Angelo***

From promising bud to plentiful bloom, the hardy elegance of *Rosa* 'Queen Elizabeth' makes it a popular choice for any summer garden. Its beauty is perfectly preserved on your pure silver coin, where rose gold plating clads each flower in the colour that traditionally signifies grace, love, and appreciation.

**2019 \$30 Fine Silver Coin—
*60 Years of Prominence The St. Lawrence Seaway by Claire Watson***

Its waters serve as the economic lifeblood for two nations. Its channels and locks connect North America's heartland to the Atlantic Ocean—and the world beyond. The Seaway is an important shipping route for two nations, as well as a destination for recreational boaters.



**2019 \$2 Circulation—
*D-Day 75th anniversary by Alan Daniel***

\$2 circulation coin honouring the brave Canadians who, landing in Normandy, France 75 years ago, helped establish the Allied foothold that would lead to the liberation of Western Europe.

**2019 \$50 Fine Silver Coin—
*Rose of the Winds by Pandora Young***

A fixture on antique maps, compasses, and even modern navigational systems, the Rose of the Winds connects us to explorers of the past. It is a centuries-old symbol of exploration that suggests a world of possibilities in every direction—and a reminder of where a person's "True north" lies.

July

**2019 \$20 Pure Gold Coin—
20th Anniversary of Nunavut by Germaine Arnaktauyok**

To mark the 20th anniversary of Nunavut’s entry into Confederation, the Mint brought back the design that appeared on our \$2 circulation coin in 1999—the year that Nunavut, a proud declaration that means “our land” in Inuktitut, became a territory.



**2019 \$25—
50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 Moon Landing by Tony Bianco**

50 years ago, humanity left Earth’s exosphere and landed the first humans on the Moon, imprinting the first footprint on its surface. History was made. Now, we look back on this day as a milestone in human history, literally reaching for the stars. While the United States launched and landed the spacecraft, Canadians also have every reason to celebrate. In fact, many don’t know that the Canadian company, Héroux-Devtek, designed the landing gear for the Apollo 11 Lunar Module. Technically, Canadian technology was the first object of Apollo 11’s mission to touch the Moon.



**2019 \$30 Fine Silver Coin—
The Fabric of Canada by Rebecca Yanovskaya**

Canada’s iconic red-and-white flag first made its way up the flagpole on Parliament Hill at noon on February 15, 1965: a moment that was decades in the making. This coin has had the colour added after it was struck.



September

**2020 \$1 Fine Silver Coin—
Peace Dollar by Susan Taylor**

Canada has long been associated with the search for a stable and secure international order. This connection began in 1957 when Lester B. Pearson won the Nobel Peace Prize for helping diffuse the Suez Crisis by creating the world’s first, large-scale United Nations peacekeeping force. Over the next 40 years, Canada’s contribution in UN peacekeeping has become an intrinsic part of the country’s international role amounting to roughly 80,000 peacekeepers.



October

**2019 \$20 Fine Silver Coin—
The Eagle Feather by Andy Everson**

Strength. Peace. Wisdom. Honour. The eagle represents the noblest qualities a person can have. As a messenger to the Creator, its wing feathers deliver thoughts and prayers to the spirit world whenever the eagle takes to the skies. This “coin” shows reverence to both the eagle and its feather—two symbols that have special cultural and spiritual significance to Indigenous peoples in Canada.



**2019 Special Edition Proof Silver Dollar—
Louis Riel- Father of Manitoba by David Garneau**

This coin, which commemorates Louis Riel’s place in history, is a celebration of the cultural legacy of the Métis Nation and its resilience. This coin highlights the contributions of Louis Riel (1844–1885), and those of the Métis Nation, to the story of Canada. A defender of Métis rights and a catalyst for change, he was born 175 years ago in Saint-Boniface, in the province he later founded. In fact, it was 150 years ago that the National Committee led by Riel drafted an initial list of rights for the Métis Nation—a declaration in which land claims and language rights were preconditions to Manitoba’s entry into Confederation.



November

**2019 25-Cent Coin—
First Canadian in Space by Tony Bianco**

35 years ago on October 5, 1984 Space Shuttle Challenger lifts off, carrying Marc Garneau, the first Canadian to travel into space. One of the seven crewmembers of Mission STS-41-G, Garneau conducted multiple Canadian-designed experiments as a payload specialist. After 8 days + 5 hours, orbiting Earth 133 times, he returned to Earth a Canadian hero. He would later set out on two more space flights: STS-77 in 1996 and STS-97 in 2000.



**2020 \$20 Fine Silver Coin—
Holiday Cookies by Maire-Élaine Cusson**

A spoonful of ginger, a pinch of nutmeg and a dash of cinnamon . . . these are the spices that make the holidays nice. This year’s holiday coin from the Mint serves up some festive magic with a Murano glass gingerbread man on a plateful of cookies for Santa! Shortbread, chocolate chip and more—these decorated treats are a sweet reminder of a holiday baking tradition that is a recipe for family fun. With this final design I am setting aside my rules of no printed designs and no ornamentation affixed to the coin, simply so I may use it as I wish readers a Joyous Holiday Season and Happiness Throughout the New Year.


